### In The Still Of The Night Have We Wept

I have always been fascinated by the poetry of the Great War, not by the more jingoistic work, but by the highly personal testimony of those who felt compelled to share their experiences through the intense medium of verse.

I do not see war as one great tragedy. I see it as hundreds of thousands of individual stories and tragedies; of those that fight and experience the horror of combat; of those who are maimed; of those who lose a loved one; civilians in a destroyed village. In constructing the show I wanted to select poetry that did not attempt to tell the story of the war (an impossible task) but rather gave a series of individual experiences within a general time framework from the start of the war to the armistice (and beyond).

I also wanted to use poetry that in some cases had a direct connection with Shetland. I therefore made a conscious decision to avoid the work of the best known poets (Owen, Sassoon etc). The bulk of the work in the piece is poems written by two Shetlanders, Jack Peterson and Ben Morrison. I have also 'imported' some other poems (from England, America and Canada) that have a specific story to tell. Of these, the majority are by women, bringing a different viewpoint to the whole show.

The company spent the first half of the rehearsal process workshopping ideas. Much of the show tonight was developed by the cast. As we acknowledge the centenary of WWI we asked ourselves a very basic question; why is it still relevant? The answer became blindingly obvious in the rehearsal room – human emotions are universal and timeless, no different now from then. Furthermore, the great tragedy is that it was not 'the war to end all wars'. The emotions expressed then are still being felt and expressed today. IN THE STILL OF THE NIGHT HAVE WE WEPT is a response of young people in the  $2l^{st}$  century to events of a century ago. It is also tragically, their response to the world of today.
